Hunter formed his quartet in 2010 to explore the possibilities and challenges afforded by the absence of a harmony instrument with compositions drawing on Johnny's long-standing interest in the piano-less groups of Sonny Rollins and Joe Henderson, through to John Zorn and Chris Speed. The quartet's music currently exists within the freer, more exploratory side of Jazz, leaning more towards the approach of Ornette Coleman, Don Cherry and Joe Harriott, whilst building on their previous explorations into Middle Eastern approaches to improvisation.

They have performed at such esteemed venues as the Band on the Wall, Ronnie Scott's, Kings Place, and at the London and Manchester Jazz Festivals, among many others. They have also appeared several times on BBC Radio 3.

BIOGRAPHY

Johnny Hunter is a northern UK-based drummer and composer who comes from a background of both the Avant-Garde and the more mainstream Jazz. He leads several of his own groups, each concerned methods of integrating with new improvisation and composition in his music. He tours regularly with his own quartet along with several other bands, including Sloth Racket, Blind Monk Trio, Nat Birchall, The Spirit Farm, Beck Hunters. He was also recently part of Jazz North's "Northern Line" scheme with the Johnny Hunter Quartet, and is now on Sound and Music's 2018 "New Voices" programme.

PROJECTS

He formed his quartet in 2010 and it continues to evolve and perform regularly across the UK. In 2013, he began his piano trio, Fragments, as a workshop band to research and develop new approaches to Free Improvisation and composing for improvisers, and they now have performed in Jazz venues across the UK. He also writes for the ten-piece large ensemble, the *Manchester Jazz Collective*, as well as for smaller groups such as *Pale Blue Dot* amongst others.

Manchester-based trumpeter Graham South is a founder member of Beats & Pieces Big Band, with which he has toured internationally and featured as a soloist on all three critically acclaimed albums. He also plays with Anton Hunter's Article XI, Cath Roberts's Favourite Animals, the Johnny Hunter Quartet and Manchester Jazz Collective, with which he performed Andrew Stamatakis-Brown's Cottonopolis commissioned by the Manchester Jazz Festival in 2017. Also, in 2016 he was a soloist in Ben Cottrell's MJF commission, New Seeing.

2018 has seen the launch of his own quartet with his New Spirituals project, a commission for Southwell Music Festival. Graham also performs regularly as an orchestral trumpeter, including with the BBC Philharmonic, Manchester Camerata and the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra. He is also a member of chamber group The Vonnegut Collective, for which he has written several new works.

BIOGRAPHY

Tenor saxophonist Mark Hanslip emerged in the mid-2000s as a key player on the London jazz scene, performing both nationally and internationally with groups such as *Outhouse*, *Nostalgia 77*, *Jonathan Bratoeff Quartet* and *TOM-MIX* (featuring the late drummer Tony Marsh), and has appeared on over 30 recordings on labels including Babel, F-iRE, Tru Thoughts, FMR and Tombed Visions.

Now based in the North, he co-leads organ trio *The Revival Room* with keyboardist Adam Fairhall, plays in trio with laptop wizard Federico Reuben and drum legend Paul Hession, and is touring with his improvising group *HTrio* plus guest US trumpeter Nate Wooley. He is also engaged in doctoral research into generative systems for improvised music at York University.

BIOGRAPHY

Bennett is one of the U.K.'s pre-eminent improvising double bass players, whose work involves free improvisation and composition for improvisers. He maintains a busy performance schedule in Britain and across Europe in Jazz, Free Improvisation, English Folk music, and Contemporary Classical settings. He is a Parliamentary Jazz award winner with IDST in 2010 and has more recently been heard playing with American heavyweights such as Joe Morris and Jeb Bishop, with Swiss Afro-punk Dadaists, Orchestre Tout Puissant Marcel Duchamp, and with the father of Ethio-Jazz, Mulatu Astatke.

PROJECTS

Recent works include *En Bas Quartet*, a low string quartet for improvisers, *All Lovers are the Song*, a suite of six pieces for string trio and voice, and contributions to several recorded works, including CD releases by improvising quintet *Sloth Racket*, the *Julie Tippets/Martin Archer Ensemble*, *Orchestre Tout Puissant Marcel Duchamp*, and the large ensemble *Favourite Animals*.
